030924.08 Playpark

- 8.1 It was noted that, over the summer, the maintenance plan has been updated and the contractor has been informed. The change relates to the shady area around the willow structure which had previously been left wild but will now be mown. This followed a survey of the Playpark Committee which showed that park users wished for it to be returned to being mown so families can use it. This includes keeping the leat clear.
- 8.2 Members discussed the permanent fixing of plastic ground shields around the basketball hoop. The ground would need levelling prior to the grounds shields being laid. After discussion, it was agreed to obtain a quotation. The Chairman will arrange this.
- 8.3 Members discussed the future of the Playpark Committee. The Chairman advised that, some years ago, the Committee was set up as a Charity in order to raise funds to purchase and install new playpark equipment. Members of that Committee have now requested that the Charity is wound up and that the play park is passed back in its entirety to the Parish Council to run. They would continue to organise informal events (such as Easter egg hunts, pumpkin carving etc) for the children.

After discussion, it was thought that having a mechanism for raising charitable funds to improve/replace the current equipment would be useful to have. It was agreed to look at major sources of funding and whether there is a requirement/preference for applications to be submitted by a registered charity. It was also agreed to look into the minimum requirements for running a charity and how the constitution could be changed, if required. This would be discussed again next month.

8.4 Other matters

- 8.4.1 Cllr Fairman advised that he had finished realigning the leat through Little Bewden into Playpark and it is flowing very well.
- 8.4.2 It was agreed that a date should be arranged to review and carry out the required maintenance in the playpark and that work should be prioritised. There was a discussion about whether the fencing and gates were a priority. Cllr Crook advised that it was not a ROSPA requirement for equipment to be fenced off. The Chairman advised that members of the Playpark Committee had suggested coming to a Parish Council meeting to discuss the playpark. It was suggested that they are invited to the October meeting to gather their views and ideas on the future of playpark.
- 8.4.3 It was agreed that a permanent sign should be made and put up on the inside of the main playpark gate directing people to the toilets in the shop. The Chairman will ask Matt Powell if he could make something suitable.

New Community Woodland for South Hams

An exciting and ambitious woodland deal for a new 65-acre community woodland has been agreed and will be created in South Brent.

With the support of the Government's Trees for Climate Land Acquisition Fund, South Hams District Council has been able to buy the site. This is part of the District Council's priority to tackle climate change and increase biodiversity by 20% over four years. tree planting will start later this year with a community planting event.

Leader of South Hams District Council, Cllr Julian Brazil, says: "We are so thrilled and excited about this project. As an ambitious administration this is all about what we are trying to achieve. It emphasises our priority around the climate change and biodiversity agenda, but it does so much more. We will be working with local schools, social prescribers, and other local community groups. It will leave a lasting legacy for the South Hams. We hope to plant around 25,000 trees on this site. It is the start of us planting a tree for every resident of the South Hams"

As part of the woodland, the fields will continue to be a productive landscape, with parts of the site still being grazed. As part of the varied community proposals, an orchard and a market garden will be created in partnership with local group, Sustainable South Brent to deliver the project for their local area. They are passionate about the project and will use some of the woodland for education and community food production.

Over the coming months South Hams District Council will engage with local residents over proposals for the site and consider detailed design and planting with the community, partners and stakeholders. The planting will be supported through a partnership with the Woodland Trust and their MoreWoods scheme.

Outreach Manager for the Woodland Trust, Eleanor Lewis, says: "This is an excellent opportunity for a new woodland serving the South Hams. MOREWoods is an established scheme that provides expert advice, funding and trees to landowners who want to create a woodland."

"With careful planning this site can deliver huge benefits for people, wildlife and climate, as well as incorporating local aspirations for continued local food production on part of the land. We look forward to working collaboratively to design a woodland that can deliver multiple benefits with the local community at its heart."

The next step is to share proposals with the local South Brent community at a drop-in event. This will be held on Wednesday 14 August in the Aune Room, Old School Community Centre in South Brent from 3 to 8 p.m.


South Hams Council demands answers from South West Water

At its July meeting District Councillors unanimously resolved to demand that South West Water makes significant environmental and water quality improvements and called on the Chief Executive to attend a Water Summit with MPs, Councillors and community groups. The motion:

- Calls on the government to recognise the guiding principle in all policy that clean water is a right and not a commodity;
- Calls on the government to ban all bonuses and company dividend payments until such time as the Environment Agency's Environmental Performance Assessment (EPA) metric is 'good' (4 stars);
- Calls on the government to limit the time to no more than five years to reach an EPA of 4 stars after which it would take the company into 'special measures' with a view to the possible creation of a public benefit company or re-nationalisation;
- Calls on South West Water to provide a detailed plan and timetable on how it intends to achieve an EPA of 4 stars and to undertake to consult with and seek the approval of all the local authorities in its service area:

- Calls on South West Water to provide a detailed plan on how it intends to reduce leaks by at least 50% in the next 5 years;
- Calls on South West Water to provide a full explanation of why it initially failed to detect the
 presence of cryptosporidium in the Brixham water supply, either directly or through regular
 monitoring for e-coli as a proxy for its possible presence;
- Calls on the government to strengthen the Environment Agency and the Drinking Water Inspectorate so that they are better able to monitor and provide oversight of the water services sector;
- Requests the CEO of South West Water to attend a session of this Council's Overview and Scrutiny Committee to answer questions;
- Calls on the board of South West Water to give serious consideration to their position if the requests
 of this Council are unacceptable;
- Calls on the CEO of SWW to attend a water summit of local MPs, Councillors and Community Groups to explain the cause of recent failures, provide plans for remediation and answer questions, to be held by 30 September 2024;
- And in the meantime, highlights to Devon County Council that a review is required on the impacts of South West Water's vehicles and services causing damage to other infrastructure (i.e. highways and rural roads that are not being repaired and maintained). This Council therefore calls upon Devon County Council to address (as a matter of urgency) the outstanding damage and repairs that are required to be addressed.

Dartmoor dig uncovers Early Bronze Age burial cist

Archaeologists have made 'stunning' discoveries after excavating an Early Bronze Age burial cist at Cut Hill. northern Dartmoor.

Led by Dartmoor National Park Authority painstaking work revealed an exceptional cist - a stone-built box used to bury the dead in prehistoric times - containing well-preserved wood and a host of other material yet to be identified.

The Authority is now seeking funding for micro-excavations of the cist and the future conservation of any artefacts, and is encouraging people to contribute to the Donate for Dartmoor fund.

Cut Hill stands at 603-metres high – one of five peaks on Dartmoor that's over 600m – and lies within the military firing ranges.

Cist excavations were prompted when local historian Paul Rendell reported to the Authority that the feature was eroding out of the peat. Site surveys and analysis, including radiocarbon dating of charcoal from inside the cist, gave a date of around 1,800BC - or 3,800 years old.

In May, Dartmoor National Park Authority unanimously supported a full archaeological intervention. The dig took place in early August with the team working in all weathers, from bright sunshine through to thick fog and persistent rain.

Excavations revealed a prehistoric cist of around one-metre square – over twice the size of the Whitehorse Hill cist – and topped with three granite capstones. Not only was the cist bigger than expected, but it contained multiple pieces of wood that appear to have been deliberately shaped and cut.

The volume of material under the wood reaches a depth of about 30cm meaning there's every chance it could contain objects or artefacts that can't yet be seen.

The team worked respectfully to wrap and seal the cist to conserve its contents. A special all-terrain vehicle was used to carefully transport the cist off the moor. It is now in the care of the Wiltshire Conservation and Museums Advisory Service, part of Wiltshire Council, where it will undergo micro-excavations.

The Cut Hill project is a partnership involving many skilled individuals and organisations.

Alongside Dr Bray was National Park and Historic England Archaeologist Andy Crabb; Laura Warren-Ratcliffe, Alexandra Taylor-Redish and Paul Redish from the Cornwall Archaeological Unit (CAU); the University of Leicester's Dr Laura Basell; Professor Ralph Fyfe of the University of Plymouth; Andy Coleman, Elliot Clarke and Josh Ashby of Quantock and Exmoor Ltd.

In addition, support and funding was given by landowner the Duchy of Cornwall. Support also came from the Ministry of Defence, the South West Peatland Partnership, Alec Collyer MBE and the Forest of Dartmoor Commoners' Association.

Meticulous micro-excavations of the cist's contents will be conducted in controlled laboratory conditions. Any artefacts uncovered will be conserved and analysed with outcomes published when work is complete. Post-excavation works to restore the site to its original condition have been completed.

The site was visited by the BBC's Digging for Britain team, who will be following the story as it unfolds.

Dartmoor joins UN-backed Race to Zero in world first

Dartmoor and all other UK National Parks have joined the UN-backed Race to Zero initiative.

In July it was announced that the UK's National Parks had become the first protected landscapes in the world to join the Race to Zero.

Race to Zero commits cities, companies, regions, financial and educational institutions to take immediate and effective action to halve carbon emissions by 2030 and reach net zero by 2050 at the latest.

Dartmoor is already playing a significant role in reaching net zero goal with the Partnership Plan setting an ambition for the National Park to be carbon negative by 2045. Work already underway includes nature enhancement through landscape recovery areas, peatland restoration, natural flood management, woodland management and creation, and testing and trialling land management and farming practices.

In 2019, Dartmoor was the first National Park in the UK to declare a climate and ecological and quickly put in place its own Climate Action Plan.
